

FACTORS TO CONSIDER

- 1. No cohort is the same the data is gathered across the PI/4/7 pupils for that session;
- 2. For the last 4 years, our role across P1/4/7 has increased.
- 3. There has been an increase in the number of additional support needs across our school. This can be attributed to better identification but also to the government's 'presumption of mainstream' agenda.

2018/2019 Analysis Report

In literacy, the biggest gap appears to be in P4 (32% gap). In Primary 4, the targeted group is significantly underachieving compared to the non-targeted group. In this cohort, 71% of the targeted group has an identified additional support need. There is a similar profile in the Primary 7 cohort, where 53% of the targeted group has an additional support need. In Primary 1, 2 and 6 the targeted group on track is similar to or exceeding the non-targeted group in reading.

OUR INTERVENTIONS

Our PEF Plan and SIP enables us to target interventions and resources towards those pupils who require support to achieve within the curriculum. In the last few years, we have sought to do this through:

POINTS TO CONSIDER

- The publication of data cannot be used to compare with other schools.
- There are other factors affecting attainment other than the academic ability of our pupils, that are often out with the control of schools.
- As schools, we also measure individual attainment based on our own measures and expectations. If this was the data to be published, our attainment story would look very different.
- The resources purchased to support learners, such as IDL, Clicker 7 and Phonic readers are used to allow our learners who have specific learning difficulties achieve success in their own right. It is highly likely that they will not reach the benchmarks set by the Scottish Government (and so will never be thought to have 'achieved a level') but they will have achieved in their own right by reaching individual targets set for them.
- Attainment in Literacy across SLC for the last 3 years has gone from 75.7% (2016/17), to 72.1% (2017/18) to 71.8% (2018/19), underlining the fact that schools are facing more challenges in literacy attainment for many of the reasons already explained.

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NURSERY EXPANSION

- Our new nursery will cater for 125 places (up to 185 children)
- There will be an ASN provision, a 2-3 year provision and a 3-5 provision:
 - 10 x 2-3 ASN places
 - 15 x 3-5 ASN places
 - 15 x 2-3 years places
 - 85 x 3-5 year places
- Each will have their own playroom (there will be 2 x 3-5 year playrooms) and access to outdoor space.

- The new provision is a 52 week nursery, open from 8am – 6pm.
- Meals will be served in a brunch/lunch/afternoon tea style. These will be prepared by the school canteen and transported to the nursery.
- The staffing structure has yet to be decided.
- Our existing nursery will remain open, termtime, for up to 50 children to attend 9am-3pm due to capacity issues across the learning community.

SCHOOL EXPANSION

- Work will begin on the construction of 2 new classrooms above the canteen when school closes in June 2020.
- Construction will be completed by mid-August 2020, but internal works will take another 4 weeks.
- For the first 4 weeks of the new term, children will be offered soup and sandwiches from the canteen. These will be served in the gym hall.
- The POD will remain until all works are carried out and the classes are ready.
- The classes will be full-sized and come equipped with C-Touches.
